The Prayer of Examen

Series 2/6- Seeking the Transformation We Need

You can't be good without praying

Intro: Prayer changes things, people say. It also changes us.

The purpose of prayer:

- A. Examen refers to the tongue, or weight indicator, on a balance scale. Conveying the idea of an accurate assessment of the true situation.
- B. It is possible today for people to go to church services week in and week out for years with out having a single experience of Examen
 - No wonder so many people struggle in life and are barely hanging on
 - 1. But the Bible witness is so rich in it's testimony.
 - a. Psa. 139:1 New Living Translation The Message
 - b. 1 Chron. 28:9 (David's testimony)
 - c. 1 Cor. 2:10 (Paul reminds us)
 - d. They experienced the examen of God as something of immeasurable strength and empowerment
- C. There are two aspects in the prayer of examen: like the two sides of a door.
 - 1. Examen of consciousness— We discover God's daily presence/ how we've responded to his presence.
 - 2. Examen of conscience— We uncover those areas that need cleansing, purifying, and healing.

I. The Examen of Consciousness (Remembrance)

- A. In the prayer of consciousness we prayerfully reflect on how God's been at work in us and how we've responded
 - 1. We consider how we have handled others or seen God
 - a. Awareness of others pain and loneliness
 - b. God is inviting us to share in His creation
- 2. The examen of consciousness is the means God uses to make us more aware of our surroundings B. The prayer of examen is also how we heed the call to rehearse the mighty deeds of God.
 - 1. Ever noticed how often the Bible urges us to remember?
 - a. Abraham?
 - b. Israel/Egypt?
 - c. Decalouge
 - d. David?
 - e. Heir of David
 - f. Bread and wine. . . Calvary?
 - 2. Israel defeated the Philistines, Samuel set up a stone memorial between Mizpah & Shen (Ebenezer)
 - 1 Sam. 7:12- "Thus far has the LORD helped us."
 - a. This is what the examen of consciousness is all about
 - c. We are raising our own personal Ebenezer and declaring, "here is where God met me and helped me. We are remembering

II. The Examen of Conscience (Scrutiny [examine/probe])

- A. We are inviting the Lord to search our heart to the depths
 - 1. We boldly speak the words of the Psalmist in 139:23.24
 - 2. Without apology and without defense we ask to truly see what is in us
 - a. For our sake
 - b. For our good
 - c. For our healing
 - d. For our happiness
- B. It is a joint search for two reasons
 - 1. Lone examiners of our heart—have a thousand justifications to declare our innocence.
 - Since God is with us in the search, we are listening more than we are defending
 - 2. The other end of the spectrum is our tendency to beat ourselves up
 - a. We would take a good look at who we really are and declare ourselves un-redeemable.
 - b. He will never allow us to see more than we can handle

Conclusion: Take heed

- A. Do not depend on your own diligence to examine yourself rather than God for the discovery of your sins
 - 1. If it is solely self-examination, we will be trapped in either excessive praise or blame Luke 18:10-14
 - 2. When you are accustomed to this kind of surrender (inviting God in to scrutinize) you'll find that as soon as a fault is committed, God will rebuke it through an inward sense (a nudge if you will)
 - a. God will allow no evil to be concealed in the lives of his children
 - b. But we have to prepare ourselves to hear from God
- B. Examen of consciousness & conscience are like waves: They are distinct from one another, not totally separate
 - 1. How do we really practice the prayer of examen?
 - a. Not by turning upward or outward, but by turning inward
 - b. Anthony Blooms writes:

Prayer:

Precious Savior, why do I fear your scrutiny? Yours is an examen of love. Still, I am afraid... afraid of what may surface. Even so, I invite you to search me to the depths so that I may know myself—and You—in fuller measure
